Lesotho has embarked on awareness raising activities together with the Ministry of Health, whereby we wish to eliminate the use of mercury amalgam, promote the use of cost-effective and clinically effective mercury-free alternatives for dental restoration, encouraging representative professional organizations and dental schools to educate and train dental professionals and students on the use of mercury-free dental restoration alternatives and on promoting best management practices, discouraging insurance policies and programmes that favour dental amalgam use over mercury-free dental restoration, encouraging insurance policies and programmes that favour the use of quality alternatives to dental amalgam for dental restoration, promote the use of best environmental practices in dental facilities to reduce releases of mercury and mercury compounds to water and land.

Part C: Comments regarding possible challenges in meeting the objectives of the Convention (Art. 21, para. 1)

- Promulgation of the law is taking much longer than was anticipated. of which we belief once enacted, it will assist with enforcement of the provisions of the Convention.
- Quantification of mercury added products remains a challenge for as long as their HS codes are not clearly defined.
- Management of mercury waste is another challenge. Proper waste management is already a problem as we do not have a landfill and all hazardous waste has to be disposed in South Africa. This is becoming very costly.
- There is no Artisanal Small Scale Gold mining in Lesotho but it is highly practiced by Basotho men in South Africa, who sometimes bring the mercury to Lesotho and expose their families. This is a socio-economic problem resulting from the practice in South Africa but highly affecting Lesotho.
